

# Master of Education in Teaching and Learning

The Master of Education (MEd) in Teaching and Learning is designed for professionals seeking advanced studies in education. The program supports students' development as scholarly practitioners through coursework and a capstone portfolio. The program examines curriculum, teaching, and learning in Alaska and similar contexts, emphasizing place-based, culturally sustaining education. In consultation with a faculty advisor, each student identifies a professional focus area related to professional practice and career aspirations.

<sup>2</sup> The 3 required credits should be taken as follows: 1 credit at the beginning of program, 1 credit in the middle of program, and 1 credit at the end of program. Contact a faculty advisor for more information.

<sup>3</sup> Sample focus areas include leadership, adult and professional learning, language and literacy education (ELL), Indigenizing education, instructional design and technology, special education, and children's mental health. Additional focus areas can be identified through consultation with a faculty advisor.
